

Dear Sixth Grade Parents,

My name is Miss Natalie Bender and I am thrilled to welcome you and your children to my class for the 2023-24 academic year! I hold a Bachelor of Arts degree from Saint Anselm College, reside in Candia, NH, and am a parishioner of St. Stanislaus Catholic Church in Nashua. I have had the immense pleasure of working with your children as an aide to Mrs. Ryan and substitute teacher during the past year and am so excited to continue growing with them as they prepare for junior high school and beyond!

In sixth grade your children will be given frequent opportunities to develop their leadership skills through group projects and mentorship opportunities with younger students. Mrs. Ryan will be the sixth grade math teacher while I will teach the remaining core subjects of grammar, science, social studies, religion, writing, spelling, reading, and geography. Both fifth and sixth grade will be housed in the new modular building this year, so transitions between the two classrooms will be easy and safe. The students' homework will consist of math, grammar, and geography assignments as well as twenty minutes of reading for a total of about 50-60 minutes per night. We will do many in-class writing projects this year, both creative and professional, in preparation for secondary school and will enrich our understanding of the world around us through regular history projects and geography assignments. Most importantly, we will strive to be saintly role models for the younger grades at all times through the diligent practice of Christian charity and the integration of Mass, group prayer, and virtue-based activities into our daily lives at St. Francis School.

The summer work for my sixth grade class consists of reading *Ben and Me*, a light-hearted work of historical fiction based on the life and inventions of Benjamin Franklin, and completing a short reading comprehension packet. Since we will be studying American history in sixth grade, I intend for this humorous book to be both enjoyable for my students to read and helpful in introducing them to the political issues and important figures associated with the American Revolution. Your child received a copy of *Ben and Me* from Mrs. Ryan before summer vacation began and I have attached the reading comprehension packet to this letter. My expectation for my students is that they read the entire book before beginning to work on the packet. The exercises in the packet are open-book and open-notes; I do not mind the students' use of sources other than *Ben and Me* as long as they stay off the internet (they will need to use a dictionary in order to complete one of the exercises). **Your child's completed packet as well as his or her copy of *Ben and Me* are due on the first day of school.**

In addition to the required reading of *Ben and Me*, I highly encourage my students to read as much as possible over the summer, especially books they enjoy! Please find attached a fun reading log for your child's use. I will award prizes to those students who read at least five chapter books by the end of the summer. **Reading logs must be submitted by the end of the first week of school.** Since, as mentioned above, we will be studying American history in social studies, I suggest that your child read at least one of the books based in colonial or Civil War era America from the list below to help familiarize them with some of the topics we will encounter

this year. Mrs. Ryan has also requested that the rising sixth graders practice their math facts regularly over the summer and use the resources on [ixl.com](http://ixl.com) to keep their hard-earned skills fresh.



## Venn Diagram








